


# DLP® Projector













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## SAFETY

## **Important Safety Instruction**


- Do not block any ventilation openings. To ensure reliable operation of the projector and to protect from over heating, it is recommended to install the projector in a location that does not block ventilation. As an example, do not place the projector on a crowded coffee table, sofa, bed, etc. Do not put the projector in an enclosure such as a book case or a cabinet that restricts air flow.
- To reduce the risk of fire and/or electric shock, do not expose the projector to rain or moisture. Do not install near heat sources such as radiators, heaters, stoves or any other apparatus such as amplifiers that emits heat.
- Do not let objects or liquids enter the projector. They may touch dangerous voltage points and short out parts that could result in fire or electric shock.
- Do not use under the following conditions:
  - In extremely hot, cold or humid environments.
    - (i) Ensure that the ambient room temperature is within  $0^{\circ}$ C ~  $40^{\circ}$ C
    - (ii) Relative humidity is 10% ~ 85%
  - In areas susceptible to excessive dust and dirt.
  - Near any appliance generating a strong magnetic field.
  - In direct sunlight.
- Do not use the unit if it has been physically damaged or abused. Physical damage/abuse would be (but not limited to):
  - Unit has been dropped.
  - Power supply cord or plug has been damaged.
  - Liquid has been spilled on to the projector.
  - Projector has been exposed to rain or moisture.
  - Something has fallen in the projector or something is loose inside.
- Do not place the projector on an unstable surface. The projector may fall over resulting in injury or the projector may become damaged.
- Do not block the light coming out of the projector lens when in operation. The light will heat the object and may melt, cause burns or start a fire.
- Please do not open or disassemble the projector as this may cause electric shock.
- Do not attempt to service the unit yourself. Opening or removing covers may expose you to dangerous voltages or other hazards. Please call Optoma before you send the unit for repair.
- See projector enclosure for safety related markings.
- The unit should only be repaired by authorized service personnel.
- Only use attachments/accessories specified by the manufacturer.
- Do not look into straight into the projector lens during operation. The bright light may harm your eyes.
- This projector will detect the life of the light source itself.

- When switching the projector off, please ensure the cooling cycle has been completed before disconnecting power. Allow 90 seconds for the projector to cool down.
- Turn off and unplug the power plug from the AC outlet before cleaning the product.
- Use a soft dry cloth with mild detergent to clean the display housing. Do not use abrasive cleaners, waxes or solvents to clean the unit.
- Disconnect the power plug from AC outlet if the product is not being used for a long period of time.
- Do not setup the projector in places where it might be subjected to vibration or shock.
- Do not touch the lens with bare hands.
- Remove battery/batteries from remote control before storage. If the battery/batteries are left in the remote for long periods, they may leak.
- Do not use or store the projector in places where smoke from oil or cigarettes may be present, as it can adversely affect the quality of the projector performance.
- Please follow the correct projector orientation installation as non standard installation may affect the projector performance.
- Use a power strip and or surge protector. As power outages and brown-outs can KILL devices.

Warning: Do not use a spray containing flammable gases to remove dust or dirt from the lens. This may cause a fire due to excessive heat inside the projector.




Warning: Do not clean the lens if the projector is warming up as this may cause the lens' surface film to peel off.


## Installing the projector


Your projector is designed to be installed in one of four possible positions.

Your room layout or personal preference will dictate which installation location you select. Take into consideration the size and position of your screen, the location of a suitable power outlet, as well as the location and distance between the projector and the rest of your equipment.










Projector should be placed flat on a surface and 90 degrees / perpendicular to the screen.

- How to determine projector location for a given screen size, please refer to distance table on pages 53 - 54.
- How to determine screen size for a given distance, please refer to distance table on pages 53 - 54.


#### Note:

- Ensure that the projector is positioned at the following specifications:
  - a. The projected surface is flat and perpendicular to the ground.
  - b. The projector is placed at 80-350 cm away from the projected surface.
  - c. Horizontal and vertical keystone correction and projection angle is within  $\pm$  40 degree range. (Optimized within  $\pm$  30 degree range)
  - d. The further away the projector is placed from the screen the projected image size increases and vertical offset also increases proportionally.
  - e. Keep at least 15 cm clearance of the projected image from the border of the curtain or obstacles.




## **Projector installation notice**

• 360° free orientation operation




Allow at least 15 cm clearance around the exhaust vent.



- Ensure that the intake vents do not recycle hot air from the exhaust vent.
- When operating the projector in an enclosed space, ensure that the surrounding air temperature within the enclosure does not exceed operation temperature while the projector is running, and the air intake and exhaust vents are unobstructed.
- All enclosures should pass a certified thermal evaluation to ensure that the projector does not recycle exhaust air, as this may cause the device to shutdown even if the enclosure temperature is with the acceptable operation temperature range.

## Connecting sources to the projector



**Note:** To ensure the best image quality and avoid connection errors, we recommend the use of "Ultra High Speed HDMI Cable" with HDMI 2.1a certification up to 5 meters.

## Adjusting the projector image


#### Install the projector

Ensure that the projector is positioned at the following specifications:

- a. The projector is placed on a flat surface and parallel to the ground.
- b. The projected surface is flat and perpendicular to the ground.


#### Image height

The projector is equipped with a kickstand. Open the kickstand to adjust the image height from 0 to 90°.




#### Auto focus and auto keystone

Make sure the Auto Focus function is On in the Display menu to automatically adjust image distortion caused by tilting and moving the projector.



- Ensure that the projector is positioned at the following specifications:
  - a. The projected surface is flat and perpendicular to the ground.
  - b. The projector is placed at 80-350 cm away from the projected surface.
  - c. Horizontal and vertical keystone correction and projection angle is within ± 40 degree range.(Optimized within ± 30 degree range)


 Make sure the Auto Keystone function is On in the Display > Geometric Correction menu to vertically adjust image distortion caused by tilting or moving the projector.



- Ensure that the projector is positioned at the following specifications:
  - a. The projected surface is flat and perpendicular to the ground.
  - b. The projector is placed at 80-350 cm away from the projected surface.
  - c. Horizontal and vertical keystone correction is within  $\pm$  40 degree range. (Optimized within  $\pm$  30 degree range)

## Installing / replacing the battery

- Push the button and unscrew the battery cover. Use a coin to turn the battery cover counterclockwise until the cover opens.
- 2. Install new battery into the compartment. Remove the old battery and install new one (CR2032). Ensure that the side with a "+" is facing up.
- 3. Put the cover back. Then use a coin to turn the battery cover clockwise to lock it in place.







#### **CAUTION:**

To ensure safe operation, please observe the following precautions:

- Use CR2032 type battery.
- Avoid contact with water or liquid.
- Do not expose the remote control to moisture or heat.
- Do not drop the remote control.
- If the battery has leaked in the remote control, carefully wipe the case clean and install new battery.
- Risk of an explosion if battery is replaced by an incorrect type.
- Dispose of used battery according to the instructions.



Warning: Do not ingest battery, Chemical Burn Hazard.




If the battery compartment does not close securely, stop using the product and keep it away from children. If you think batteries might have been swallowed or placed inside any part of the body, seek immediate medical attention.


#### Effective range

Infra-Red (IR) remote control sensor is located on the rear sides of the projector. Ensure that the remote control is held at an angle 15 degrees perpendicular to the projector's IR remote control sensor to ensure correct functionality. The distance between the remote control and the sensor should not be longer than 6 meters (19.7 feet).

- Make sure that there are no obstacles between the remote control and the IR sensor on the projector that might obstruct the infra-red beam.
- Make sure the IR transmitter of the remote control is not being shined on directly by sunlight or fluorescent lamps.
- Please keep the remote controller at least 2m away from fluorescent lamps or it may malfunction.
- If the remote control is close to Inverter-Type fluorescent lamps, it might become ineffective from time to time.
- If the remote control and the projector are within a very short distance of one another, the remote control might become ineffective.




## Powering on / off the projector



### Powering on

- 1. Securely connect the power lead and signal/source cable. When connected, the Power LED will start breathing white light.
- 2. Turn on the projector by pressing the "U" button on the projector or on the remote control. The Power LED will start flashing white.
  - The Optoma boot logo and then animation are displayed on the screen.



3. A launcher screen will display in approximately 10 seconds and the Power LED will turn steady white.



#### **Powering off**

- 1. Select one of the following methods to power off the projector:
- Press the "U" button twice on the remote control.
- Press the "U" button on the projector or on the remote control. The Control menu will open:



Select Power Off to power off the projector.

- 2. The cooling fans will continue to operate for about 3 seconds for the cooling cycle and the Power LED will be flashing red. When the Power LED starts breathing white light, this indicates the projector has entered standby mode.
- 3. Disconnect the power lead from the electrical outlet and the projector.

Note: It is not recommended that the projector is turned on immediately, right after a power off procedure.

## Selecting an input source

Turn on the connected source that you want to display on the screen, such as computer, notebook, video player, etc. Press the "⊖" button on the remote control to select the desired input.

Note: If Auto Source is enabled in the OSD menu, then the projector will detect the source automatically.




#### Launcher screen overview

The Launcher screen is the Home page to start the projector. It contains system date and time, system status, shortcuts to access various apps, and more.

To navigate the Launcher screen, simply use the buttons on the remote control.

You can return to the Home screen at any time by pressing " " on the remote control, regardless of your position in the user interface.



#### Note:

- The selected menu or item is highlighted in light blue color, for example "Settings" on the image above.
- New "Display Share" & "File Manager" apps will be available by 2024/1/M. To use these new apps, you need to upgrade projector's firmware.

# System date and time

Date and time is displayed on the Home screen if the projector is connected to the network. The default setting is 10:00am, 2023/01/01. AM/PM will appear only if the 24-hour format is off.

To modify date and time parameters, select the respective field on the screen. The Date and Time settings page opens automatically. Then perform the modifications.

#### **Control menu**

Select on to open the Control menu. Then select any of the following:

- BT Speaker: Play music from your smartphone via Bluetooth. Refer to page 24.
- Power Off: Power off the projector. Refer to page 22.
- Turn Off Screen: Turn off the screen backlight. Press any button on the remote control to turn the screen backlight on again.

#### Audio mode

To play music from your smartphone or from the flash disk, do the following:

- 1. Connect the WiFi dongle to the projector. Refer to page 16.
- 2. Enable Bluetooth on your smartphone and projector.
- 3. Press the "U" button on the remote control or select on the Home page.
- 4. Select BT Speaker.



5. Select your smartphone in the list of detected Bluetooth devices to start the pairing process.



**Note:** If Bluetooth is not enabled and/or WiFi dongle is not connected to the projector, then the projector will display the below error message. Repeat steps 1 to 4 and try again to connect the projector to your smartphone.



6. Upon successful Bluetooth pairing, the projector will display a countdown message and the screen will turn off after 10 seconds.




- 7. While in BT Speaker mode and the screen is turned off, press any of the following remote control buttons:
  - "Volume +/Volume-": Adjust the playback sound.
  - "Mute": Mute the playback.
  - "Return": Exit the BT Speaker mode.
  - "Power On / Off", "Source", "Home", "Menu", "Four directional select keys", "Display mode", "APP menu": Turn on the screen and after 3 seconds display the countdown message.

## Menu navigation and features

Press "\equiv on the remote control or on the Home screen, select the OSD menu "\equiv or review projector information or manage various settings related to the image, display, system, and audio.

- 1. When OSD is displayed, use the up and down navigation buttons to select any item in the main menu. While making a selection on a particular page, press "**Enter**" to enter submenu.
- 2. Press the "◀" and "▶" button to select the desired menu item. Then press "**Enter**" to open its sub menu.
- 3. Press the "▲" and "▼" button to select the desired item in the sub menu.
- Press the "Enter" button to enable or disable a setting or press the "◄" and "▶" button to adjust a value.
- 5. Select the next item to be adjusted in the sub menu and modify as described above.
- 6. To exit, press "
  " (repeatedly if necessary). The OSD menu will close and the projector will automatically save the new settings.



## Floating menu

Floating menu is displayed automatically if you select certain menu items. Press the "◀" and "▶" button to select the setting or adjust the value. Then press "♠" to return to the main OSD menu.

# Image settings menu

## Image settings picture mode menu

There are several predefined display modes that you can choose from to suit your viewing preference. Each mode has been fine-tuned by our expert colour team to ensure superior colour performance for wide range of content.

- Vivid: In this mode, the color saturation and brightness are well-balanced. Choose this mode for playing games.
- HDR / HLG: Decodes and displays High Dynamic Range (HDR) / Hybrid Log Gamma (HLG) content for the deepest blacks, brightest whites, and vivid cinematic color using REC.2020 color gamut. This mode will be automatically enabled if HDR/HLG is set to Auto (and HDR/HLG Content is sent to projector – 4K UHD Blu-ray, 1080p/4K UHD HDR/HLG Games, 4K UHD Streaming Video). While HDR/HLG mode is active, other display modes (Cinema, Reference, etc.) cannot be selected as HDR/HLG delivers color that is highly accurate, exceeding the color performance of the other display modes.

Note: This option is only available for 1080p model.

- Cinema: Provides the best balance of detail and colors for watching movies.
- Game: Optimises your projector for maximum contrast and vivid colours allowing you to see shadow detail when playing video games.





## Display geometric correction menu

#### **Auto Keystone**

- When the Auto Keystone is used, the Four Corner Adjustment function will be disabled.

#### V. Kevstone

#### H. Keystone

Adjust image distortion horizontally and make a squarer image. Horizontal keystone is used to correct a keystoned image shape in which the left and right borders of the image are unequal in length. This is intended for use with horizontally on-axis applications.

#### **Rotation**

Rotate the projected image.

#### **Four Corner Adjustment**

This setting allows the projected image to be adjusted from each corner to make a square image when the projection surface is not level.

#### Reset

Return the factory default setting for geometric correction settings.

## Display projection location menu

Select the preferred projection location between front and rear.

## Display projection orientation menu

Select the preferred projection orientation between auto (automatic detection), desktop, or ceiling.

## Display digital zoom menu

Use to reduce or magnify an image on the projection screen. Digital Zoom is not the same as optical zoom and can result in degradation of image quality.

Note: Zoom settings are retained on power cycle of the projector.

## Display aspect ratio menu

Select the aspect ratio of the displayed image between the following options:

# Display eye protection sensor menu

Enable eye protection sensor to temporarily dim the brightness when objects are too close to the projector beam.

# System menu

## System auto source menu

Choose this option to let the projector automatically find an available input source.

## System direct power on menu

Choose "On" to activate Direct Power mode. The projector will automatically power on when AC power is supplied, without pressing the "Power" key on the projector keypad or on the remote control.

## System signal power on menu
